

1. Learning a Language:

When will my child become fluent?

- To become fluent, one must be immersed through being surrounded by the language in the home or by living in the country where the language is spoken.
- Fluency involves becoming familiar with and practicing specific rituals and traditions.
- Culture includes language, food, customs, and traditions
- Age 13: What would happen if we placed a focus on equipping children and their families before they turn 13?
- What impact does facing the reality of learning a language have on those over 13 through adults in our congregations?

1. Providing Tools:

Atama...Kata...

- Learning a language involves action and hands-on involvement . The result? It sticks!
- Providing opportunities to build relationships.
- Providing consistent words to describe core rituals and traditions and name them is key.
- Repeating more than once and embedding faith practices in the ministry of the congregation leads to fluency.
- Fluency results in being a way of life. It defines the DNA of a congregation.

3. Immersion:

- Surrounding children and youth with a common language and adults who speak the language is immersion.
- Immersion leads to learning about the culture of a community. Every faith community has a culture.
- If you gave a survey and asked people in your congregation to identify Christian traditions or Lutheran traditions, could they do it readily?
- We make assumptions that we are already immersing people. We assume they speak our language.

4. Fluency:

- It doesn't happen in 1 hour week. In fact it doesn't happen in 5 hours or 10 hours a week!

- It leads to thirsting to gather with those who speak the language.
- Could you name more than 5 people in your congregation you consider to be fluent?

5. Application:

- The message/sermon normally includes life application.

- It connects us to God's Word.

We seldom follow up with conversations relating scripture to our own lives.

How and where does one have opportunities to apply what they learn and realize it is a way of life?

6. Challenges:

 The opportunity to evangelize lies in our faith fluency and is dependent on how we describe ourselves.

- Although we have programs to help others, how often do we verbalize our actions through Christian language?
- How do we move from faith community to the world?

Off the Base! (comfort zone)

- The opportunity for outreach lies in our fluency in the language of faith and is dependent on how we describe ourselves.
- Although we have programs to help others, how often do we verbalize our actions through Christian language?
- How often do we add faith to everyday conversation and everyday life celebrations?
- How do we move from faith community to the world?
 We get "off the base"

"Cultures are what make countries unique."

Culture is a word for people's 'way of life', meaning the way groups do things. Different groups of people may have different cultures.

A culture is passed on to the next generation by learning, whereas genetics are passed on by heredity.

Culture is seen in people's writing, religion, music, clothes, cooking, and in what they do.

"Cultures are what make congregations unique."

Defining a basic culture:





1. Caring Relationships – Where do caring relationships happen in the faith community? Around tables for fellowship? In homes?







2. **Rituals** – What rituals or rites of passage do families in the congregation list they do at home? How do these rituals interface with their faith?













3. **Traditions** – What types of traditions passed down through generations are celebrated in homes of the congregation? How do they tie these traditions to their family history? How do they tie them to their faith?

4. **Values** – The core of a culture is formed by values. What do you value most in the congregation? What do you think others value most? What do you value most in your home?













If we would like to view the faith community through a cultural lens, we need to be honest with one another and open to truthful, caring relationships.

Immersion = Fluency

Our goal? Fluency in the faith. It's a way of life!

Let's take a look at 5 basic principles for living and passing on faith...

Milestones Ministry Five Principles for living and passing on faith

- Faith is formed by the power of the Holy
 Spirit through personal, trusted relationships
 often in our own homes.
- The church is a living partnership between the ministry of the congregation and ministry of the home.

Milestones Ministry Five Principles for living and passing on faith

- Where Christ is present in faith, the home is church too.
- Faith is caught more than it is taught.
- If we want Christian children and youth, we need Christian adults.



What is a milestone?

A milestone is a meaningful, memorable moment in the lives of individuals and communities.

Milestones in our lives can be life changing. Some are happy. Some can be sad and fearful times.

3. Bless it

Offer a prayer in a worship service, cross+generational event, and/or the small group or home event to embrace people's lives with the grace, mercy, and peace of God in Christ.

4. Gift it

Provide a gift to help the participants recall a particular milestone in their lives with faith, hope, and love

5. Reinforce it

Offer a follow up event to help deepen the faith formation impact of the Milestone Ministry experience. Encourage and support faith practices recommended at the initial Milestone event and, when helpful, explore new ones.



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Introduction



Milestones Ministry

Milestones Ministry brings an awareness of the presence of God to individuals of all generations through a vital partnership between home and congregation. Milestones Ministry provides a clear and usable model for congregations, homes, and community to connect faith formation resources with daily life experiences. The rich variety of Milestones Ministry does the essential ministry of the church: promoting Christian faith formation and outreach into the larger community. The outreach element is accentuated when the celebration of milestones is offered for the entire community and not just congregational members.

Milestones Ministry provides a clear and usable model. Individuals and larger households can participate in a way of life that marks special moments and honors them as important to the journey of faith. This model provides the means to implement Vibrant Faith Ministries' vision for passing on faith—a vision that places children of all ages in the center of the church's concern and sees God's redeeming work at play through home, congregation, community, culture, and creation.

Milestones incorporate a simple structure that includes naming, equipping, blessing, gifting, and reinforcing so that the Milestones Ministry event has a greater chance to take deeper root in lifelong faith formation.

At the heart of equipping people for their lifelong faith formation are the Four Keys. These faith practices are central to every milestone and integrated into people's daily lives as well as the life of the local congregation. The Four Keys:

Caring Conversations

Devotions

Service

Rituals and Traditions

These four daily faith practices are simple, doable, and practical. The Four Keys are used to open the imagination of individuals, families, small groups, and congregations with the gospel of Jesus Christ. They provide ways to nurture the Christian faith and reach out to others with the love of God in Christ. They serve as a catalyst for people to wonder about and play with a variety of ways to celebrate and practice the Christian faith in their daily lives.

To maximize its effectiveness, Milestones Ministry includes role modeling of the Four Keys in the congregational setting and incorporates opportunities for a follow-up gathering about a month later. The benefits of Milestones Ministry are more deeply rooted in the lives of people when they are able to gather again for a faith formation check-up. Therefore, each Milestones Ministry event offers a follow-up gathering that includes a Four Keys outline.

What is Milestones
What is Ministry?

Milestones Ministry provides a faith milestone as a marker along life's journey that says, "This is something important and God is here, too." It is a faith formation practice for both home and congregation that helps all generations recognize God's presence in everyday life.









Backpack Milestone

Many congregations have found the blessing of backpacks to be a very meaningful way to mark the passage of summer. It is a helpful transition for children, youth, and adults to the new fall schedule. It is also an opportunity to discover God's presence with us at home, school and work, and to be reminded that Jesus is always with us.

Going to school for the first time or returning to school for another year carries with it the challenges, anxieties, hopes, and opportunities that fill the lives of children, parents, and other caregivers we many diverse emotions and wonderments. Ther prime time to acknowledge our and God's goodness.

5 Part Structure

and f the part sure a way to begin the year and each school day with the Four Keys that nurture the Christian faith: caring conversations, devotions, service, and rituals and traditions.

We bring children, parents, and other adults together to recognize this time of the year by providing the opportunity to bless backpacks by incorporating a simple structure that includes:

Naming – It is important to recognize this time of year as the end of summer and the beginning of new, and sometimes hectic, schedules for families.

Equipping – All ages are given the opportunity to practice the Four Keys and have time to take a deep breath, exhale slowly, and claim values and faith that establish and direct our lives beyond the fears, anxieties, and pressures of life.

Blessing – The blessing of the backpacks allows us not just to imagine, but also to experience the larger picture of life—the one that says life is not dominated or formed by pressures and uncertainties.

Gifting - You may give a gift as a physical reminder of this occasion, such as a zipper pull or key chain. (See Appendix 1.)

Reinforcing – It is a good idea to follow up after the Backpack Milestone by connecting this group one more time to share stories about how their school year is going. The Backpack Milestone Follow Up is on page 7. 1. Name it

Notes for Leadership

For the Leader

Identify a team to help plan
this milestone. As the
leadership team plans for the
Blessing of the Backpack
Milestone, notice the Optional
Milestone focus (see Appendix
2). It encourages extending this
milestone to give attention to
the nonstudent population in
congregations and
communities.

Although the original and central thrust of the Blessing of the Backpack Milestone is to reach out to children and youth who are going back to school, it really serves a larger purpose and population. People of all ages are going back to school as student or staff. Some will be pursuing a GED or college degree or some kind of technical training for the workplace.

The fall has the cultural feel of new schedules for most people in society. Even if someone in one's own household is not beginning a year at school, he or she will most likely know of children, youth, or adults who are. Pall schedules will quite likely affect all ages. Summer vacations have come to an end, and many people feel the urgency of another cycle of heetic schedules.



Planning for this Milestone

- Check the school calendar to determine which Sunday precedes most of the school openings. Arrange with worship planners to have a blessing at worship service(s) on that weekend.
- Decide which gift will be a reminder of the occasion, such as a key chain, zipper pull, or one of the gifts listed in Appendix 1.
 Allow enough time to order gifts.
- Publicize by making an outdoor banner to invite the community.
 Sample wording: Begin This School Year with a Blessing of the Backpacks at [Date and Time]! Remember, signs alone do not go new people to come. There is no substitute for personal invitations.
- Since not all children can afford a backpack, you might encourage individuals in your congregation to make a spen offering of backpacks (or money to purchase them) so that children will have one.
- Compose a notice for the church bulletin. (See Appendix 2.)
- Think through ways faith talk can continue at home after the Blessing of the Backpack Milestone takes place. Examples: 1.
 Taking Faith Home bulletins sent via email or provided weekly at worship. 2. Sending home links to <u>Vibrant Faith@Home</u>. 3.
 FaithTalk Cards, and 4. Blessing Bowls. (See Appendix 1)
- Explore ways to involve adults who do not have school-aged children in the home. (See Appendix 2 for the Optional Milestone Focus.)
- Expand this milestone to invite people from the community as well as members of the congregation.

Begin the session with an introduction that emphasizes the importance of learning for everyone, including the students beginning another year at school. Acknowledge that all people are beginning their fall schedules.

Preparation:

- · Light snack of honey and crackers, and napkins
- · Servers for set up and clean up
- Have some new backpacks available as gifts to children in the local community. Have gift-wrapping and/or gift note cards ready so that the groups can wrap the backpacks and/or write personal notes of encouragement to those students who will receive the backpacks.
- Nametags

Event Outline:

Caring Conversations

Ask people to have a discussion in their small groups. Complete these sentences:

Devotions

Read Scripture: Proverbs 9:10 (CEV)
Respect and obey the Lord! This is the beginning of wisdom. To
have understanding you must know the Holy God.

After reading the Scripture, talk about how it may relate to learning and the new school year. Give honey and crackers to each small group, and have each person give another person a cracker with a drop of honey on it and say the following: May the sweet taste of honey remind you of the sweetness of God's love and instruction for your life. As you continue to learn for a lifetime, remember that respecting and obeying the Lord is the beginning of wisdom.

Service

- Take some time to name people who have taught you in the past. What did they teach you? Thank God for this person.
- Think of a skill you have or something you know that you could teach to someone. Plan a time to do so.

Rituals and Traditions

Gather again in circles and close by praying together: Dear Lord, you have blessed us with many people who have taught and mentored us in life. Bless us now as we go forth from this place with an excitement for learning and a desire to use our skill and knowledge to care for people and all creation. In the name of the Pather, Son, and Holy Spirit. Amen.

Bless one another before dismissing: "May you respect and obey the Lord."

Worship and Blessing

Choose a time during a worship service to recognize students and their backpacks. Invite all who are students, from children to adults, with and without backpacks, to come forward for the blessing.

Leader:

At this time, we are delighted to invite forward those who participated in the Backpack Milestone. We encourage them and all of us to continue the faith practices of caring conversation, devotions and service to build a ritual and tradition in all our homes as a way of life. (Distribute additional gift, if desired, for all as a physical reminder of this milestone. See Appendix 1.)

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

An important step after role modeling the Four Keys in a cross+generational or small group setting is to bless and equip families to continue practicing faith by using the Four Keys in their homes.

Approximately one month after the initial event, bring students and families back together for a follow up to continue building relationships and facilitating the Four Keys as an intentional step to encourage faith traditions in the congregation and at home.



+ Appendix 2 - Backpack

Optional Milestone Focus:

In addition to offering a blessing to classroom students, you may wish to expand the Blessing of the Backpacks Milestone celebration to honor all people with daily routines. Let this milestone opportunity be an invitation to anyone who wishes to begin the fall season by having his or her daily life activities blessed by the triune God. This could also be a time to encourage adults to engage in the routine of studying the Bible. The first part of the bless could focus on classroom students beginning a year of study. The next part could reach out to all others. Nonstudents could bring their briefcases, computer bags, tool belts, Bibles, kitchen aprons, gardening tools, calculators, or whatever it is they identify as a part of their daily lives. Including physical items (like backpacks or gardening tools) will help make the moment memorable. For those who come without anything in hand, you could make and present a simple certificate that acknowledges their participation in the Blessing of the Backpacks Sunday. Be sure to buy enough of the gift item for these participants, too.

Blessing for a New Home

PREPARATION Invite family and friends to your new home. Place a small candle in each room to be blessed and carry a lit candle with you. Mark the following verses in your Bible for easy reference: Proverbs 24:3; Psalm 121:8; John 13:34; Psalm 145:15-16; Psalm 4:8; Isaiah 32:18. Add hymns or songs if you like.

If you are leading this blessing in someone else's house, change pronouns when necessary.

WELCOME

For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven. Welcome to this time for blessing our home.

RITUAL ACTION

(Gather outside, if possible.) Read Proverbs 24:3. Let us pray: O God, as candles bring light to this home, so enable (home owners) to be your light in this neighborhood. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen Light the candle and say, Christ is present! (Move to the entrance.)

Read Psalm 121:8. Let us pray: Defender God, protect and guide those of us who live here; our going out and our coming in; and let us share the hospitality of this home with all who visit, that those who enter may know your love and peace. Amen Light the candle and say, Christ is present!

(Move to the family or living room.)

Read John 13:34. Let us pray: Giver of joy and love, bless all who share this room that through you we may be bound together in a community of love. Amen Light the candle and say, Christ is present! (Move to the kitchen/dining room.)

Read Psalm 145:15-16. Let us pray: Blessed are you, Lord of heaven and earth, for you give us food and drink to sustain our lives and make our hearts glad. Help us to be grateful for all your mercies and mindful of the needs of others. Amen Ligh: the candle and say, Christ is present!

(Move to the bedrooms.)

Read Psalm 4:8. Let us pray: Lord, you provide rest for the weary and renewal for our bodies and spirits. Bless our times of rest that we might be refreshed and energized for your service. Amen

Ligh: the candle and say, Christ is present! (Return to the family or living room.)

Read Isaiah 32:18. Let us pray: O God, we pray you will bless this home and bless (names) with your gracious presence. Let your love be our inspiration, your wisdom our guide, your truth our light, and your peace our benediction, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen

Join hands and pray the Lord's Prayer (p. 84).

BLESSING

May the Lord watch over us as we go out and come in now and forever. Amen

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CARING CONVERSATIONS

Discuss in your household or small group:

- Who first told you about Jesus? Who and what have helped you learn about him over time?
- Jesus said that his disciples would be "witnesses" for him (Luke 24:48). What is a witness?
- In what ways are you a witness for Jesus to others? Share about your joys and your challenges in speaking to others about Jesus.

DEVOTIONS

Jesus calls his followers to be his witnesses, to share with others their faith in him (Luke 24:46-47). In your household prayer times this week, pray for relatives, friends, or neighbors who are not Christians. Ask for God's help to share Jesus with them in word and deed.

SERVICE

April 22 (Tuesday) is observed across the world as EARTH DAY. For Christians, Earth Day is an occasion to thank God for creation and reflect on how we might better care for what we have been given. Discuss ways in which your household can act to better protect the environment, such as using less power at home, recycling waste, planting trees and collecting litter. Commit to one act of environmental care this week.

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS



Milestones Ministry: An Effective Model for Lifelong Faith Formation

A faith milestone is a marker along life's journey that says, This is something important and God is here, too. It is a faith formation practice for both home and congregation that helps all generations recognize God's presence in everyday life. David Anderson

n theory, Sunday school is a good model to teach the Christian faith. However, in many congregations across the country, attendance is low and leadership is thirsting for a magic pill to make it all better and move back to the success of the past. We try name changes. We try time changes. We try weaving Christian education into worship services. Across denominations, we have shown concern and been in conversation about the need to revisit the way we plan and execute Christian education programs for more than a decade. The Teaching Church by Eugene C. Roehlkepartain and Educating Congregations: The Puture of Christian Education by Charles Foster were written in the mid-90's. Both are relevant today and are being used by leaders to help re-evaluate the way we do faith formation.

Debbie Streicher is a member of the Milestones Ministry Team serving as a writer, developer, and coach. She also serves as President of the Christian Education Network of the ELCA. Over the past 15 years, Debbie has served in the role of volunteer and on staff for all aspects of Christian education in a congregation. She has facilitated, overseen, organized, and developed faith formation programs from infants through adults. She worked intricately with Faith Inhubators resource development and from means among accurate accurate management and remaining these materials for over 15 years. Debbie has held volunteer leadership roles in education and evangelism at synod and national levels for 12+ years. Her vision is to involve all ages in faith formation, strengthen family relationships through spiritual growth, and empower God-given gifts to do ministry.

All milestone (both congregational and daily life) events include the entire family, friends, and relatives. They happen in large gathering settings and in the home. We recently celebrated my husband's retirement in our home. We invited friends, family, and neighbors.

- Naming: This was a time to recognize my husband's retirement and transition to a new lifestyle.
- Equipping: We enjoyed dinner together, showed pictures of his work history. and engaged in caring conversations.
- Blessing: Each person present passed a stone with retirement written on it and gave a wish about my husband's retirement and gave him a blessing. We said a prayer.
- Gifting: The gift was the stone as a remembrance of the occasion.
- Reinforcing: The stone is a reminder every day of this special time. We often reflect on the stone and plan to intentionally revisit the topic of retirement and talk about how life has changed at the end of the year.

I asked our pastor how many have retired in our congregation in the past year. The answer was 15 or more. I have begun to think about those 15 and about their friends who may have retired also. What milestones can be recognized in your own congregation and community this year?

Milestones Outside the Church Walls

t is not unusual to recognize baptism, first libles, a mission trip, or entering Sunday chool, but I invite you to think beyond these nd consider how to recognize other

milestones in the lives of those in our communities

Is there a middle or high school nearby? Is there a nursing home in the area? Is there a military base close by the church? What are the needs of these people? What would invite them into a relationship with Christ? What would make them want to give their time?

Is the church near a nursing home? Celebrate 70, 80, and 90 year old birthdays. Go to them or invite them along with their families to come to you. Or honor and bless caregivers for those individuals. Both family and staff are caregivers. Those in their 70's, 80's, and 90's are the ones who filled our churches over the years. How can we recognize this?

Is the church near a middle school? Celebrate birthdays for the month. Post a banner outside the church and name one day each month where you have a party for teens. Invest in a large TV and updated video games. Provide free internet service, or invite one of the high school or middle school bands or musicians to participate. Take time for a blessing and prayer. Equip families with ideas and tools to celebrate their own teen's special day in their home with a prayer and blessing.

Is the church near a military base?

Families are constantly in transition on a base. There are some leaving for deployment and others returning. Recognize both occasions and invite families and singles for a time to be together and celebrate this significant time in their lives

Faith Markers Ministry honors a child's steps along the pathway toward believers baptism and church membership. Children are already in relationship with God and capable of growing in faith. Faith Markers are significant for the children and youth, their families, and the church community. A ritual of blessing reminds children that they are an integral part of the faith community. Faith recognition reminds parents of their role in shaping faith in their children at home. And the church community affirms its promise to be partners in forming faith in all ages.

Celebrating a milestone in our lives is important. Birthdays, anniversaries, graduations, and the list goes on. We can all think of a time when a milestone in our life was uplifted by our families with a party where friends and relatives gathered to honor important times in our lives. We received gifts and felt loved. It is good to be surrounded by many people who care about our lives and are with us for those special times. These times in our lives bring us together in an intergenerational setting where memories are made. We seldom forget about them and often seek to gather again with the same group of people to celebrate other milestones for ourselves and for others in the group.

What does faith development look like in our community from birth to when our kids go off to college and beyond? Conversations turned into ideas, then into small events and shifts, then moved into consistent programs, and eventually the whole church caught the vision for milestones.

Explore the Legacy Milestones approach that Brian Haynes and Kingsland Baptist Church use to create a common path that integrates church and home in spiritual formation through a path of seven milestones.


